



ARI Tech Tip Get That Screen Shot! (or recording...)

Sometimes when creating a digital document, you need to capture an element on the screen. It may be a logo, a header, a photo, video, or even text that you just can't find a way to copy just right. Whether on your computer or mobile device, there are quick ways to get the job done. See below to find out how to get a screenshot or recording from your device of choice.

Mobile Device

	shot applications. If you can't find one try
	Airdroid which will let you take a screen shot
	via your computer.

*Some applications can actively prevent screenshots on Android while open. If this is the case, you will get a notification stating which app is preventing the screen from being captured.

All Current Versions	Hold the <i>Sleep/Wake</i> button on the top or side of your	
Screen Shot	device, then immediately press and release the Home	
	button. The screen shot will be stored in the Photos app.

Most Versions	Holding the Windows button while pressing
	the Volume Down button will capture the
	screen and save it to the <i>Pictures</i> folder
	under Screenshots.

Computer

PC	
Most Windows Versions	Press the PrtScn (Print Screen) key. This takes
	a screenshot of the entire screen and saves it
	to your clipboard.
	Press the Windows key + PrtScn to capture
	the entire screen and save it to your <i>Pictures</i>
	library under Screenshots.
	Holding down the Alt key while pressing
	PrtScn will capture the active window and
	save it to the clipboard.

OS X		
Most OS X Versions	Holding <i>Command</i> + <i>Shift</i> + <i>3</i> will capture the entire screen and	
Screen Shot	save it to the desktop as a .png file. Opening the file in preview	
	will let you resize and save as a .jpg if necessary.	
	Holding Command + Shift + 4 will enable cross hairs which allow	
	you to select what area of the screen you want captured. aThe	
	capture will save to the desktop as a .png file.	
	Holding Command + Shift + 4 THEN pressing the space bar will	
	change the pointer to a camera. Move the camera over a	
	window and hit the <i>space bar</i> (or mouse button) and that	
	window will be captured and saved to the desktop.	
Screen Recording	1. Open Quicktime Player and select New Screen Recording	
	under the <i>File</i> menu.	
Quicktime on Yosemite	2. A recording window will open. Next to the Record button,	
(10.10) or later allows you	click the drop down menu and select Built-in microphone	
to record the screen and	to record the Mac's audio. If you want mouse clicks to
